INTRODUCTION

The state of South Carolina has an abundance of water resources with 8,000 miles of rivers, 460,000 acres of lakes, and 3,000 miles of coastline. Whether it's fishing, water-skiing, hunting or pleasure boating, these resources are used every day by thousands of recreational boaters. Currently there are 777,008 recreational motorboats registered in South Carolina with thousands of new boats being registered every year. Currently South Carolina is sixth in the nation for registered boats.

In 1973 there were sixty-four fatalities as a result of recreational boating accidents. That same year there were only 128,000 boats registered in this state. An increase in law enforcement personnel, additional laws like the Boating Safety Act of 1996, Drew's Law, and concentrated boating education classes statewide have all combined in an effort to reduce the number of accidents and fatalities.

The information found in this report is useful in our Boating Safety Education program as a reference for stressing facts relating to careless boat operation. This information helps to impress upon each student the importance of safe boating and shows that accidents do in fact happen.

This report is published by the South Carolina Department of Natural Resources Law Enforcement Investigations Section. Copies are made available to SCDNR, the news media, and concerned individuals whose efforts will make boating not only safe but enjoyable.

ACCIDENT REPORTING

When a person operating a boat on the waters of South Carolina is involved in a reportable accident, they are required to notify the South Carolina Department of Natural Resources. Accidents involving injury or loss of life must be reported within 48 hours; accidents in all other cases are required to be reported within 10 days. Any person violating these requirements is liable to a penalty for each violation.

Any of the following constitutes a reportable boating accident:

- A. Loss of life
- B. Injuries Incapacitating a person for more than 24 hours
- C. Injuries rendering a person unconscious.
- D. Injuries requiring medical treatment.
- E. Physical damage to boats or real property in excess of \$2,500.00.

All boating accident reports are forwarded to the Law Enforcement Investigations Section where they are reviewed by designated personnel for completeness and accuracy. Reports that are incomplete or lack pertinent information are returned with an explanation of what additional information is needed. The primary and secondary causes of the accident are determined by the information given in the report. Copies of all "reportable accident" reports are forwarded to the United States Coast Guard.





SUMMARY

In 1971 the South Carolina Wildlife and Marine Resources Department began investigating accidents and keeping records. The first year, with 79,804 registered boats, there were 85 reported accidents with 45 fatalities. In 2009, South Carolina had its lowest year of fatalities on record with 11.

In 2020 there were 161 accidents reported to the Law Enforcement Investigations section, which included 29 fatalities and 81 injuries. There were 78 non-reportable boating incidents.


Boating accidents occurred in every month. Fifty two percent of all accidents occurred on Saturday and Sunday. Sixty four percent occurred between the hours of 12:01pm and 8:00pm. In eighty five percent of all accidents, the operator was twenty years of age or older. In 29% of all accidents a criminal case was made.

Collision with Vessel ranks as the number one type of accident. Capsizing ranks as the number one type of fatal accident. The majority of accidents are the result of No Proper Lookout. There were 161 recreational boating accidents, with 23 percent involving Personal Watercraft.


Marine Theft Investigations Annual Report 2020

South Carolina is sixth in the country in reported thefts of boats and motors. This year the Marine Theft Investigations section conducted 811 investigations. Throughout the year, investigators examined 719 boats, with 111 motors. One boat, one motor and one trailer were recovered. The total approximate values of these recoveries were \$1,964.00. These recoveries were made by SCDNR Investigators and do not include recoveries by outside agencies. During the year investigators issued 20 summons tickets and 163 warning tickets. This year a total of 71 boats and 44 motors were reported stolen in South Carolina.


SC Registered / Titled Reported Stolen Boats / Motors




Marine Theft Recoveries 2020




Value of Recovered Property

Aids to Navigation


The Aids to Navigation Program requires regular monitoring and routine maintenance on 2,291 aids to navigation. There are 297 official Regulatory Zones throughout South Carolina. Incorporated into these Regulatory Zones are 657 No Wake Buoys, 768 No Wake Signs, 137 Boat Exclusion Buoys and 7 Boat Exclusion Signs. There are 727 hazard buoys that currently mark hazardous locations. The majority of these hazards are located on the inland lakes of South Carolina with almost 50% located on Lake Murray alone. In 2020 there were 166 Hazard Buoys, 146 No Wake Buoys, 44 No Wake Signs, and 21 Boat Exclusion Buoys placed across the state as part of ongoing maintenance. The Aids to Navigation staff continues to work closely with security personnel at all water treatment facilities and nuclear power stations on all the states lakes to enhance homeland security efforts. Maintenance of these Aids to Navigation required 2,237 man hours. Of these hours, 1,032 were boating hours.

During 2020, a total of 77 areas were investigated on the waters of South Carolina for regulatory zoning. There were four regulatory investigations that met the required consideration for official zoning. The Department of Natural Resources provides official information signs stating "Slow You Are Responsible for Your Wake" to be posted in areas that do not meet the zoning consideration, ninety one information signs were distributed in 2020. An increase in Boating Law Enforcement in these areas was also recommended to local officers in an effort increase safety and public awareness.








Aquatic Investigation and Recovery (AIR)

In 2020 the AIR Team participated in 45 recovery assignments involving 34 victims. The AIR Team recovered 22 victims on these assignments and 12 bodies were not recovered by the AIR Team.

The AIR Team responded to 11 evidence assignments and recovered evidence on 7 of the assignments.

Five divers have achieved the level of Assistant Instructor and 226 hours were dedicated to training this year.







Boating Safety Action Force

The Boating Safety Action Force (B-SAF) is a team of 26 officers that travel the state at the request of the Law Enforcement Region Captains working boating safety saturation patrols on major holidays and for special water events. The B-SAF team provides additional Law Enforcement efforts with an emphasis on alcohol detection.


The B-SAF team works 10 scheduled patrols a year, accounting for 21 days on the water, utilizing up to five boats per patrol with two officers to a boat.

This year the B-SAF team worked 19 days on the water for a total of 8 patrols utilizing an average of 4 boats per patrol. Due to COVID-19 concerns, 1 BSAF event was cancelled. A total of 842 boats were checked and 1 boat operator was tested for BUI at the B.A.T Mobile (mobile data master). The B-SAF Team issued 1 summons tickets for BUI and 31 summons tickets and 282 warning tickets were issued.






Negligent Operations / PFD Cases Made

ABANDONED BOATS

In 2008, South Carolina passed legislation to identify abandoned vessels, their owners and to impose penalties for those responsible for abandoning their vessels on State waters.

The SCDNR Law Enforcement Investigations section is responsible for managing the abandoned boat program.

During the initial survey conducted in 2009, there were 215 boats meeting the criteria for initiating an investigation. The abandoned boat numbers continue to be a significant problem along coastal areas. Boat owners, no longer choosing to be responsible for fees associated with maintaining, storing or removing their unwanted equipment, or failing to tend to their property as required, abandon their vessels on our waterways. Some owners leave their vessel unattended for years, in the seemingly "free space" of our public waterways. These derelict vessels become significant problems for the quality, safety and aesthetics of our waterways.

After surveying waterways and lakes, files are created for each vessel identified for possible abandonment. The ownership history is researched, and the file is assigned to an investigator. The investigator posts the vessels that meet the established definition. The owner or responsible party may be identified and given an opportunity to make corrections for noted problems. If the responsible party fails to correct the problem, and, only after 45 days, may be charged with abandoning their vessel on state waters. If found guilty, the owner is responsible for the boat removal within 14 days, at his/her own expense. If the owner/responsible party is undetermined during the investigation and after 45 days, without tending the vessel, the vessel is categorized as abandoned.

In 2020, we were able to remove 19 abandoned boats from Georgetown County, 15 from Charleston County, and 9 from Beaufort County.

In December 2019, a complete coastal survey was done resulting in 143 vessels being addressed. We are continuing to locate and contact owners to determine which vessels are abandoned.

In 2018, there were 32 vessels surveyed and investigated as abandoned, 31 of those vessels were reclaimed by their owners or pending disposition, and 1 vessel was destroyed.

In 2017, as a result of Hurricane Matthew there were 53 vessels surveyed and investigated in Beaufort County resulting in 17 vessels being destroyed with 4 being returned to their owners or insurance companies. The remaining vessels were reclaimed by

their owners. An additional survey was conducted, post Hurricane removals in Beaufort and Charleston counties. There were 47 vessels posted and investigated as abandoned, 40 were reclaimed by owners or removed by counties, and 7 vessels have gone through the abandoned boat process and are awaiting disposition.

The local county and city jurisdictions may remove vessels in the abandoned status category.

The combined efforts of the state and local jurisdictions will ensure our waterways will not become cluttered with abandoned vessels. The removal of these vessels will provide safe navigation for those using state waters and help in creating a higher water quality and aesthetic value, for those enjoying our water resources, while also providing a cleaner environment for organisms and wildlife that are dependent upon clean water.
